### Parameters of the report

As outlined in the National Framework for Child Protection Learning and Development in Scotland 2012 – the training is designed and delivered in relation to the General Workforce, the Specific Contact Workforce and the Intensive Contact Workforce.

The report outlines the range of courses, the range of agencies accessing the course, number of participants and the number of participants from each agency that have accessed development sessions annually.

A total of 1362 people attended, multi agency, bespoke, workshops and training in 2019.

## National Framework for Child Protection Learning and Development in Scotland, 2012

'The well-being and safety of children relies on the competences, knowledge and skills of the multi-agency workforce. Working together requires the interaction of all services, the public, children and families. For the system to work effectively, it is essential that everyone understands the contribution they can make and how these contributions work together to provide the best outcomes for children. Social workers, health professionals, police, housing and educational staff, third and private sector, all those working in adult protection and anyone else who works with children and families, should be aware that they require particular skills to protect children and young people from harm. We must not forget that the well-being and safety of children is everyone's responsibility'.

## Headline Messages

- The courses are offered and accessed by all agencies in North Ayrshire, however their has been a drop in attendance by Police colleagues from 44 in 2018 to 5 in 2019
- > Although education staff have attended throughout the year, the majority of attendees are early years practitioners
- > The third sector have increased their attendance by over 100 participants
- Health and Social Service staff remain consistent in their attendance
- Measuring the long-term impact of practice development inputs remains a challenge, and is an identified area for development in 2020/2021
- > All agencies/services that attend, value the opportunity to discuss practice issues/learning on a multi-agency basis
- Multi-agency training is identified as an essential component in building common understanding and fostering good working relationships, which are vital to effective child protection.
- Please note that this report was developed during the Covid 19 pandemic. Subsequently, this has impacted future plans for learning and development, and is referenced within the report.

This training provides the practitioner with skills in analysing harmful sexual behaviour to create profiles of risk and need and develop through case formulation, effective safety plans.

- Social services and 3<sup>rd</sup> sector have the highest attendance, with the police having the lowest attendance
- 3<sup>rd</sup> sector has had the biggest increase of almost 100 participants

## Child Protection In the Family Adult Services (Mandatory)

In March 2018 North Ayrshire Child Protection Committee published a Significant Case Review in relation to J family.

Finding 4 highlighted

#### " In North Ayrshire some services for adults take insufficient account of children connected to their clients and thereby fail to identify risks to their wellbeing and safety or alert relevant others to do so"

In response to this finding, this workshop was developed to support those working in adult services, to be able to, identify, react and report any concern they had about a child they may come into contact with.

Participants are introduced to a generic risk indicator tool, adapted from the National Risk Framework 2012 and principles of GIRFEC. The tool helps them explore the impact, of the behaviour of an adult connected to children, and offers a way to open discussions regarding what steps to take next with their line manager when they feel there is a concern.

## Child Protection in the Family Adult Services

**262** participants from adult services have accessed training at monthly sessions, these include:

- > 20 managers
- ▶ 242 staff
- Services have included,
- addictions,
- community care,
- locality services,
- justice services
- primary care services and
- intervention services.

## Child Protection in The Family Feedback

- Course raised awareness. Provided good knowledge on what to do in a situation involving child/children'
- 'Feel more confident and re-assured'
- Prior to coming on the course today my knowledge was extremely limited. This has opened up a new learning experience which I am now eager to take forward'
- Applying knowledge to practice being able to identify harm/concerns and report accordingly'

## PRISM (Practice Reflective Improvement Short Modules)

- A total of four PRISMs were delivered by the CPC Lead Officer in 2019. These sessions provide both single-agency and multi-agency opportunities to reflect and learn from cases. Two of these sessions focused on the Significant Case Review of J Family which was delivered to Child Protection Co-ordinators within education establishments. Two were delivered on qualitative evaluation work on children's experiences of the Child Protection system within North Ayrshire. Practitioners have benefited from having a safe space to discuss cases with multi-agency colleagues and reflect on their own practice in relation to child protection.
- The sessions delivered to education were well received and appreciated by education leaders and staff.



- 'It will support me in future with regards to CP procedures, recording, Ayrshare, communication and follow up'
- 'Gained a better knowledge and understanding of the importance of recording all information and SCR processes'
- 'Helped me to reflect on my current practice'
- Improved communication and the building of more effective chronologies particularly pastoral notes where actions and significant events are more precisely recorded

## Child Protection Awareness Bespoke Sessions

The coordinator has delivered several bespoke session on child protection awareness. Each session has been pitched at different levels according to the audience however all have had the same aim which is to:

- Raise awareness of different types of abuse
- How and where to report a concern, and what to expect
- Raise awareness of child protection procedures and pathway
- Raise confidence in the community regarding reporting

Each session also generated discussion around individual responsibilities, the role of identified CP officer for community groups and generally reassuring people that it is alright to be wrong.

A total of 70 people working or volunteering in North Ayrshires communities received Child Protection Awareness

Youth Council Workshop on CSE

Approximately 100 young people took part In a CSE workshop, from this at least 20 young people registered an interest in the CSE young persons group.

As of June 2020, this group has yet to be established due to the Covid 19 pandemic.

## Evaluations: Stage One General Comments

- 'Excellent and insightful lots of opportunity for worthwhile professional discussion'

## **Evaluations Stage Two**

- Stage two evaluations were sent out through Survey Monkey. 50 participants were contacted, however only 10 participants completed the survey.
- The low response rate from the survey presents challenges in relation to how the CPC can measure the impact the training has had on professional practice
- At stage two Managers are responsible for following up during supervision, however no feedback has been received. (This is an area for development)

## Evaluations Stage Three

The learning and development sub group chose 3 courses to evaluate from the last 6 months in 2019. These were:

- Child Sexual Exploitation
- Child Protection Awareness and
- Chronologies

A practice development evaluation day was planned in March, where over 30 participants agreed to take part. Members of the sub group agreed to support on the day with various workshops, reflecting on how course participants had put their learning into practice and being able to offer practical help on the day

Unfortunately this was cancelled due to Covid19 outbreak, however the coordinator feels that the number of people wanting to attend is promising and is hopeful that this will continue in 2021, although it may be organised differently and take a different format than previously planned.

# So what...? Evaluating the Evaluation!!...

- Practitioners in their immediate responses to multi-agency training events very consistently refer to the benefit of three main areas:
  - Physically being in the same room with colleagues from other agencies to understand different roles and perspectives in relation to child protection
  - Concern there is not enough communication and information sharing between agencies to keep children safe in North Ayrshire
  - That the most valuable learning comes from experiential learning namely case studies, group activities and information from SCR's

This has remain unchanged from the evaluations of the previous years report 2018. The core element of multi-agency practice development sessions requires there to be direct learning experiences within a shared physical space and discussion to support communication within operational practice. Going forward and in light of the pandemic it is now necessary to explore other ways to deliver training in a multi agency way.

## Area for Development 2020/21

**Development of E-Learning modules**: Although face to face learning is the most effective, way to learn, going forward into 2021, alternatives need to explored. Three courses have been developed, in the first instance, and are now live on the CPC website.

E-learning allows instant access through mobiles, laptops, or tablets, it is mobile and very interactive.

Education and Police Scotland have indicated that this may prove beneficial as there have been challenges releasing staff to attend physical spaces, due to a lack of supply cover.

In addition to this all levels of staff, can access E-learning, at their own pace without committing to a particular, time or date.

## Areas for Development 20/21 cont.

**Development of Virtual Courses**: Although not in the same physical space, this can still have a multi agency element, by asking participants to break into rooms for interaction. The first pilot session has been set for August for Child Protection Awareness.

- Positives of Virtual Courses: Provides multi agency interaction, learners are able to ask questions, reflect on practice, and interact with each other virtually, can potentially reach more people at the same time. No expenses for catering.
- Challenges of Virtual Courses: Relying on system(s) to work well on the day. Not sure every course on CPC training calendar will be able to be developed. Coordination of large amount of people may prove to be challenging.

## Areas for Development 20/21

As noted previously evaluating the courses at stage 2 and 3 has had its challenges. Although managers/supervisors will be discussing training and its impact during supervision, it is important they know how to report this information for the purpose of evaluation

Aim for 2021: Coordinator will develop a system to support managers/supervisors in their role, to report impact of training and further training needs for staff. This could be in the form of an email 6 weeks after the training. This area of priority will be reviewed further and identified in the updated North Ayrshire CPC Learning and Development Strategy 2021 – 2024.

## Areas for Development 20/21 Cont.

- Launching the Child Sexual Abuse strategy (first in Scotland) means that courses will require to be reviewed to ensure that appropriate practice development opportunities are available
- Children's Hearing training for all workers remains a priority for the Learning and Development subgroup, particularly in light of Covid19
- Child participatory approaches in child protection have been identified in CPC business plan as a priority for practice development
- There is a continued focus to deliver CP training in communities and key stakeholders such as PLACE staff, leisure staff, shopping centre staff and public transport
