Preface from Chief Officers

The Child and Public Protection Chief Officers are very pleased to present the 2017 – 2018 Annual Report for North Ayrshire Child Protection Committee.

North Ayrshire Child Protection Committee continues to be effectively led by Anne Houston, Independent Chair, whose term of office was renewed in 2017 for a further three years.

North Ayrshire remain committed to the vision of continuously improving services to protect children and young people. There have been both significant developments and challenges in 2017 and 2018 for child protection practice including our first Significant Case Review (SCR), North Ayrshire's involvement in the Stop to Listen Pathfinder project and the development of a new amalgamated improvement plan. We will ensure that that there is a focused drive to continuously improve services for our vulnerable children and young people.

We welcome the introduction of the National Child Protection Improvement Programme and will support the implementation of the plan and take forward the recommendations. We remain committed in providing the leadership, support and direction necessary to ensure that North Ayrshire's children and young people continue to be protected from harm.

This report outlines the main aspects of the work undertaken by North Ayrshire Child Protection Committee over the past year and we hope you find this useful and informative.

Introduction

2017 and 2018 has been a time of change, challenge and development for North Ayrshire Child Protection Committee.


North Ayrshire conducted its first Significant Case Review (SCR). The findings from the SCR have provided the foundations of a new multi-agency amalgamated improvement plan; which also incorporates findings from Initial Case Reviews (ICRs), recommendations from the National Child Protection Improvement Programme and findings from our Child Protection Committee evaluation activity. The plan will ensure that all improvement activity is focused and responsive to local development needs; and will be a live tool which will continuously be adapted and monitored as necessary via the evaluation and improvement sub-group.

Data is also indicative of record high levels of child protection activity for all services across North Ayrshire. Record numbers of child protection concerns are being shared and this demonstrates an increasing awareness of the need and importance of sharing information of concerns. New developments such as the establishment of a dedicated child protection team is having a positive effect on improvements in service delivery particularly around timescales. The committee are aware of the necessity to continuously monitor, review and analyse the data while acknowledging the impact that this has on resources.


The Child Protection Committee business plan has been changed to reflect the local development needs that have been identified in the findings of the SCR and ICRS; and has been arranged thematically. This new format provides focus and clarity on the required learning, change and development and the actions that will direct improvement. There is evidence of the positive developments that took place in 2016 – 2017 in increasing engagement directly with children and young people and our positive involvement in the Stop to Listen Pathfinder project. This will continue to be prioritised and further expanded in current and future business plans.

Improving Outcomes

National Outcome	We have improved the life chances of children, young people and families at risk
Intermediate Outcome 1	Children & young people are listened to, understood and respected.
Key activity this year to support this outcome:	North Ayrshire CPC facilitated a conference, which was led by a steering group of young people. The conference 'In My Shoes' was attended by a range of representatives from statutory and voluntary agencies across North Ayrshire. The conference was heavily directed and supported by young people; and four workshops were facilitated on Participation, Health and Wellbeing, Education and Social Media. Feedback was taken from participants in relation not only to their thoughts on the day; but also what they would individually do as a result of the conference, what their agency would do and what the Health and Social Care Partnership can do.
Priority action next year: Intermediate Outcome 2	North Ayrshire CPC will take forward the feedback from the conference and ensure that this has a role in next year's business plan. There is also going to be a piece of qualitative evaluation work taken forward, which seeks to gauge young people's views on child protection processes. This will be jointly led by the CPC and Children 1 st , who provide an independent advocacy service for young people on the child protection register. The secondary aspect of this work will be how we take the results of the evaluation forward, and ensure that processes are underpinned by strength based participatory approaches. Children and young people benefit from strategies to minimise harm
Key activity to support this outcome:	In response to a cluster of young people completing suicide, a Young People's Strategic Suicide Prevention Group and Young People's Operational Suicide Prevention Group have been established. The strategic group is working to ensure that there is a joint partnership response to the deaths and putting in place prevention strategies with the aim of avoiding further deaths by suicide as well as maintaining a strong connection between strategic planning and operational implementation. The operational group is responsible for operational planning and implementation of the actions identified in the Community Action Plan, taking forward decisions and actions on behalf of the services represented and ensuring that agencies are informed of developments and actions. This group reports into the Young People's Strategic Suicide Prevention Group which in turn reports to the Child Protection Committee. The strategic objective is being achieved by: • Establishing specific multi-agency governance arrangements for partnership working • Monitoring risk factors including instances of suicide and attempted suicide • Developing effective response mechanisms for emerging risk factors

	 Establishing an overarching Suicide Prevention Community Action Plan and monitoring its development and implementation Ensuring best practice information sharing and collaborative working with partner Local Authorities
Priority action next year:	A table top exercise will test a Crisis Response Plan in the event of a young person completing suicide. A range of partners across North Ayrshire will participate in the exercise, which will jointly be facilitated by the CPC and Police Scotland. The main objectives of the event will be to test the plan under simulated conditions and implementing any learning; enhancing multi-agency knowledge of the Suicide Crisis response plan; and raising awareness amongst key multi-agency partners of the wider ramifications of a completed suicide by a young person and the steps recommended to reduce the likelihood of future occurrences.
Intermediate Outcome 3	Children and young people are helped by actions taken in immediate response to concerns
Key activity to support this outcome:	has resulted in work streams to embed improvement within the whole system. In particular we have established a dedicated Child Protection team which is made up of existing social workers from area teams and managed by an existing team manager. This team focuses specifically on dealing with all new child protection concern referrals and carrying out all new child protection investigations. There is an emphasis on improving timescales, listening to the voice of the child and ensuring that families are very much part of the child protection process.
Priority action next year:	A multi-agency short life working group will be established to take forward the Implementation of the National Missing Person's Framework within North Ayrshire. NACPC will have an informed position in respect of the strategy which will support the prevention of young people going missing and limiting the harm associated when they do go missing. Feedback will be obtained from both agencies and young people to assess the long term impact of the framework. Return discussion national best practice will be taken forward through learning and development opportunities for staff, which will mean that young people who engage in return discussions will receive appropriate support following a missing episode.
Intermediate Outcome 4	Children and young people's needs are met
Key activity to support this outcome:	North Ayrshire CPC engaged in the Stop to Listen Pathfinder project. The Stop to Listen Steering Group developed and facilitated 'whole school' workshops to 130 staff in three local primary schools including janitorial, catering and school support staff and multi-agency workshops with social workers, police officers, health and other associated staff. The workshops focused on child sexual abuse and the Stop to Listen Approach. The workshops improved staff confidence and competence by reflecting on current practice and supporting practitioners to engage in

	dialogue around making improvements.			
Priority action next year:	A Child Sexual Abuse/Child Sexual Exploitation Short Life Working Group has been established to take forward the			
	arning from the Stop to Listen project and ensure that North Ayrshire has an informed working position in			
	response to Child Sexual Exploitation. The working group will develop a project action plan which will support the			
	protection of children and young people from all forms of Child Sexual Abuse.			

Self - Evaluation

North Ayrshire Evaluation and Improvement sub-group audited a sample of child protection case conference and core group minutes. This activity examined the clarity of actions, timescales, if actions were being completed and if not, whether the Reviewing Officer followed this up. This activity highlighted a number of improvement areas, findings have been shared with the child protection committee and improvement action is underway.

A short life working group has been established to take forward evaluation work on strength based participatory approaches during child protection processes. This is a joint piece of work which Children 1st, and will seek qualitative feedback from children regarding their experiences. This is currently underway and the recommendations will be taken forward by the Public Information and Engagement sub-group.


PRISM - Practice Reflection and Improvement Short Modules

A PRISM session was facilitated by the Child Protection Committee on the findings of North Ayrshire's recent Significant Case Review (SCR). The session supported practitioners to reflect on the findings of the SCR and in particular, the importance of collaborative communication between agencies. Two further SCR PRISM sessions are scheduled to take place next year, one of which will have a specific focus for education staff.

Annual Statistical Report


This section contains key data for the period 1st August 2017 to 31st July 2018, with national comparison where this is available.

Chart 1: Number of concerns about children which are shared with the Health and Social Care Partnership




The 995 Child Protection concerns received this year represent the most concerns received in one year in the last 6 years. There was a 14% increase in the number of concerns received compared to last year.

Chart 2: Number and outcome of Child Protection Investigations completed




There were 516 Child Protection Investigations (CP1s) completed in 2017/18 – the most completed in any year in the last 6 years, and a 38% increase on the number completed last year. This increase suggests that although we had the highest number of concerns received in 6 years, they were relevant concerns, as the number of investigations also increased. Furthermore, this year saw the highest proportion of CP1s proceeding to case conference, so again although there was a high number of investigations, they were appropriate.

Chart 3: Number of Case Conferences and percentage of children who are placed on the register from a conference




2017/18 saw the highest number of initial case conferences and the highest number of pre-birth case conferences in the last 6 years. As the grey line in the chart shows, 90% of children who had a conference were then placed on the register so this further suggests that it is the right cases which are proceeding to conference.

Chart 4: Number of registrations to and de-registrations from Child Protection Register




In line with the increases in Child Protection Concerns, CP1s and case conferences, there was a substantial increase in the number of registrations to the CP register this year. The 272 registrations is a significantly higher number than in any of the previous 5 years, and a 96% increase on the number last year. The number of de-registrations also increased from last year, though not as dramatically.

Chart 5: Length of registration at time of de-registration




In 2017/18, just under two thirds of children de-registered from the Child Protection register had been registered for less than 6 months - this is the highest proportion since 2012/13. The number of de-registrations after 6-12 months continued to decrease - 30% of de-registrations were after 6-12 months. As in previous years only a small number of registrations lasted over 1 year.

Chart 6: Reason for de-registration



This year saw the highest proportion of de-registrations due to improved home situations in the last 6 years – 74% of de-registrations in 2017/18 were for this reason. There was also a decrease compared to last year in children being de-registered due to becoming accommodated.

Chart 7: Child Protection Timescales



We can see in 2017/18 there was a clear improvement in performance against CP timescales. The percentage of Child Protection investigations completed within 14 days of the notification of concern increased from 2% last year to 34%, while the percentage of case conferences which occurred within 21 days of the notification of concern increased from 1% to 10%. It should also be noted that many cases which did not meet the 21 day target in 2017/18 occurred just outside the 21 days. This is an area of continued focus.

The above table shows the annual rate (per 1000 of children aged 8-16 (offence) and under 16 (non-offence)) of children referred to the reporter each financial year from 2011/12 and shows North Ayrshire and 4 comparator authorities identified by the head of service. The re has been a generally decreasing trend of children referred to the reporter in North Ayrshire, and the rate of children referred on both offence and non-offence grounds has decreased this year compared to last. In 2017/18 North Ayrshire had a lower rate of offence referrals than Dundee and West Dunbartonshire, but the highest rate of non-offence referrals amongst the comparator authorities.

The table above shows the number of children subject to Compulsory Supervision Orders as at 31st March each year for the last 7 years as a rate per 1000 of children aged under 16 in each area. Like in the other areas, the rate has decreased over the past 7 years in North Ayrshire, however North Ayrshire still has a higher rate than the comparator authorities and the national average.

The table above shows the number of children with a Child Protection Order referral each financial year for the last 7 years and compares North Ayrshire against the 4 comparator authorities identified by the head of service as a rate per 1000 of children aged under 16 in each area. Note if there are fewer than 5 the rate is not given to ensure the anonymity of the data. In 2017/18 the rate of CPOs in north Ayrshire matched that of the national rate, and was lower than Dundee and West Dunbartonshire.

Broad Summary

North Ayrshire continues to experience a high level of child protection activity at all stages of the child protection process, and the data above illustrates significant increases and changes in trends within the past year.

Increasing numbers of concerns about children are shared with the Health and Social Care Partnership and a high number of child protection investigations are undertaken each year. The number of child protection investigations progressing to case conference is also the highest recorded rate in the past 6 years. Furthermore, the rates of children being placed on the child protection register has remained high and is indicative that although higher numbers of child protection concerns are being shared and progressing to conferences; practitioners are risk assessing appropriately.

The majority of children and young people are now on the child protection register less than 6 months, and the highest proportion of children being de-registered are due to improved home situations. The proportion of children who are de-registered due to improved home situations is also at the highest rate recorded; and will continue to be monitored by the Management Information Sub-group.

In 2017, the new child protection team was established within the Health and Social Care Partnership to manage initial referrals and improve timescales for the completion of investigations and progression to case conference. Significant improvements have been noted in 2017/2018, however there is acknowledgement that there is still a continuing need to improve. The Management Information Sub-group will continue to discuss and explore strategies to support the improvement of timescales in a climate of high child protection activity.

The number of children being referred to the Children's Reporter within North Ayrshire has decreased; however both rates for offence and non-offence are higher than the national average. North Ayrshire has a significantly higher rate of children and young people being referred on non-offence grounds. Similarly, the number of children on Compulsory Supervision Orders have also decreased but is higher than the national average (although it is noted that the comparative areas are also higher; however North Ayrshire is the highest). North Ayrshire equals the rate of the national average for children being referred for a Child Protection Order.

Significant Case Review

North Ayrshire convened its first Significant Case Review (SCR) in 2017, and concluded in 2018. The SCR was undertaken using the Social Care Institute for Excellence (SCIE) Learning Together Approach which has ensured that there is a clear understanding of the case specific findings and wider systems findings, and to support continuous learning. The multi-agency review team was led jointly by independent accredited SCIE reviewers and had appropriate representation across key agencies. The review sub team received group support and supervision from SCIE during the review process. In addition to support from SCIE, the review team appropriately consulted colleagues involved in implementing GIRFEC locally to provide professional expertise to better understand practice in North Ayrshire. The following findings were identified from the review:

- 1) The systematically driven blurring of terms (single agency, universal services, early years) in North Ayrshire results in a loss of clarity about the appointment of a lead professional which leads to a lack of co-ordinated overview of children's needs.
- 2) In North Ayrshire there seems to be a tendency for professionals across all agencies to assume that giving and receiving information equates to communicating, which can lead to misunderstandings about the current assessment of children's situations. This leaves children without services to address both their wellbeing and their protection longer than necessary.
- 3) In North Ayrshire professionals across all agencies are tending to restrict the evidence of children's experience to what they say, which results in both missed cues and the privileging of the voices and view of adults (family and professional).
- 4) In North Ayrshire some services for adults take insufficient account of children connected to their clients and thereby fail to identify risks to their wellbeing and safety or alert relevant others to do so.
- 5) The use of AYRshare is inconsistent within and across agencies in North Ayrshire and this creates risks to clear communication about children.

It was recognised that these findings identified cultural change needed within and across agencies which applied more broadly than specific child protection staff and services. A joint session was held with the Lead Reviewer, Chief Officers, Chair and other representatives of the Child Protection Committee to agree how best to take these forward across agencies.

Two Initial Case Reviews (ICRs) were also convened in 2017. A multi-agency short life working group was established to take forward improvement actions in response to the findings of the SCR and ICRs and to find ways of encouraging cultural change which respond less easily to traditional 'action plans'. It was agreed that a comprehensive plan which addressed not only the findings of the reviews; but also outstanding actions from previous ICRS, the recommendations from the Child Protection Improvement Programme (CPIP) and recommendations identified from audit activity was required. An amalgamated improvement plan has been established, and is being monitored via the Evaluation and Improvement Sub-group.

Within the plan the following priority outcomes have been identified:

- 1) Professionals work collaboratively to meet the needs of children and clear lines of responsibility are understood across partners to ensure that there is a clear co-ordinated overview of children's needs.
- 2) Professionals work in collaboration with each other to meet the needs of children and all communication between agencies is effective in minimising potential risks.
- 3) Practitioners take an individualised approach to meet children's needs holistically and use all necessary guidance, tools and resources to consider their verbal and non-verbal communication needs, their environment and the influence and capacity of significant adults within their lives.
- 4) A collaborative, strategic multiagency approach is taken to promote positive emotional wellbeing in young people and both practitioners and communities have an awareness of how to access mental health support.
- 5) A culture which promotes ongoing practice development, reflective honest discussions between professionals and effective support and supervision is embedded within North Ayrshire to ensure that children's safety needs are central to all decision making and assessments.
- 6) North Ayrshire Child Protection Committee will continue to review all actions and recommendations of the National Child Protection Improvement Programme and deliver the implementation plan to take these forward locally.

The plan is a live, working tool which will be continuously reviewed and updated accordingly.

North Ayrshire Child and Public Protection Chief Officer's Group

The North Ayrshire Child and Public Protection Chief Officers Group meet quarterly to scrutinise progress with the Child Protection Committee business plan and self evaluation activity. They provide strong leadership and direction in response to updates from the Child Protection Committee Chair and Lead Officer, and consider the links across the public protection forum as well as issues common to the three Ayrshire local authorities.

The Chief Officers provide leadership and direction across child protection, adult support and protection and multi-agency public planning arrangements (MAPPA).

The National Child Protection Improvement Programme (CPIP) introduced regional leadership events to network, share good practice, review and discuss new risks facing children and young people. All members of North Ayrshire's Chief Officer Group have engaged in the first of these, and look forward to the opportunities that the future events bring.

Fulfilling the Child Protection Committee Functions - Progress

This section has been completed under the eight core business functions as detailed in, "National Guidance for Child Protection in Scotland".

1. Raising Public Awareness

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

- Our annual large public awareness raising event was held in Irvine shopping Mall in July 2018, with support from all partners. The event focused on emotional wellbeing, online safety and general child protection awareness
- The National 'Eyes Open' Campaign was commissioned by Child Protection Committees Scotland to raise awareness of child protection and advise the public of appropriate contacts in the event of them being worried about a child during the summer holidays. North Ayrshire raised the profile of the campaign within the local newspapers
- North Ayrshire Child Protection Committee and North Ayrshire Adult Support and Protection Committee are jointly facilitating stalls at Participatory Budgeting events across North Ayrshire which attracts community groups and the general public
- NACPC have hosted a stall at market place events open to the public and professionals where information about child protection was made available
- We have appointed a new chair to our Public Information & Engagement Subgroup and produced a comprehensive work plan for next year

OUTCOMES

- Adults, children and communities are engaging with events and receiving information in relation to child protection and appropriate contacts.
 The public have an increased awareness of their responsibilities and who to contact.
- Parents and carers have an increased awareness of online safety and how to keep their children safe.

SELF EVALUATION STATEMENT

Children, young people, families, members of the public and professionals in North Ayrshire receive information about child protection and the work of the Child Protection Committee in a number of different ways.

2. Policies and Procedures

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

- Review of NACPC Communications Strategy and publication of updated strategy.
- Review and update of GIRFEC vulnerable children and young people in North Ayrshire guidance
- We established a new working group to update and the review the social work procedures, with a focus on ensuring that the information is
 accessible and user-friendly for practitioners

OUTCOMES

- Updated Communications Strategy which ensures that North Ayrshire are utilising a range of means to communicate with the public in relation to child protection
- Updated GIRFEC vulnerable children and young people guidance which will support services in working together to protect children.
- · Platform established to ensure that social work procedures are current, updated, accessible and user friendly

SELF EVALUATION STATEMENT

NACPC works with partners to develop and regularly update written guidance and procedures in order to support consistent child protection practice which is based on current knowledge and research.

3. Self Evaluation and Management Information

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

- Audit and Evaluation sub-group is now known as the Evaluation and Improvement sub-group reflecting the emphasis on improvement
- The introduction of a single amalgamated improvement plan
- Robust evaluation activity in relation to child protection case conferences and core groups
- Analysis of individual risk factors for children placed on the register
- The introduction of a dedicated Child Protection Social Work Team
- Analysis and improvement of CP investigation and conference timescales
- Review of child protection management information

OUTCOMES

- A comprehensive, focused amalgamated improvement plan to monitor improvement activity
- Implementation of learning from evaluation activities.
- Improved timescales for children subject to CP processes

SELF EVALUATION STATEMENT

Children and young people in North Ayrshire receive services which are subject to a rolling programme of self evaluation and improvement.

4. Promoting Good Practice

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

- Continued successful implementation of PRISM
- A presentation was delivered to CPC Scotland on the methodology used for the Significant Case Review
- North Ayrshire has consulted with Child Protection Committees Scotland in relation to a national minimum dataset, and has volunteered to be a test partner
- The mechanisms of a strategic and operational young people's suicide prevention group and crisis response plan have been shared with East and South Ayrshire

OUTCOMES

- Practitioners across services in North Ayrshire have access to increased opportunities for multi-agency reflection and learning
- North Ayrshire shares relevant local learning across Ayrshire and nationally in Scotland

SELF EVALUATION STATEMENT

NACPC takes opportunities to learn from review of local practice and effectively shares this learning to promote continuous improvement.

5. Training and Development

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

- Successful delivery of the 2017 multi-agency training programme
- Stop to Listen Whole school workshops delivered to 130 staff in 3 local primary schools
- Local multi-agency briefings in respect of Getting Our Priorities right
- The development of a child protection course for practitioners in adult services in collaboration with the HSCP Learning and Development Team
- The facilitation of a 'Taking forward our SCR day' to inform the best ways of taking forward the findings of the SCR
- The development and facilitation of child protection training for taxi drivers in collaboration with Police Scotland

OUTCOMES

- Increased levels of staff from key agencies attending child protection learning and development opportunities.

- Services feel more confident and competent in responding to child protection issues
